



About the LSAT

The Law School Admission Test (**LSAT**) is a requirement of every American Bar Association (ABA) accredited law school in the United States. The exam measures your verbal and analytical (logical) reasoning abilities, skills considered essential for success in law school.

The LSAT is a half-day (four to five hour), standardized test administered four times each year at designated testing centers throughout the world by the Law School Admission Council, or LSAC. You may take the test up to three times in a two year period. The LSAT is divided into five sections: two Logical Reasoning sections, one Analytical Reasoning section, one Reading Comprehension section, and an unscored Experimental section, which looks just like one of the other four sections. These multiple-choice sections can appear in any order on the test. The LSAT also includes an unscored Writing Sample that always comes last.

Your performance on the four scored sections results in a scaled score ranging from **120-180** points. Although you will not receive a score for the Writing Sample, a copy of your essay will be forwarded along with your LSAT score(s) to the law schools to which you apply.
